The Officers and Council are pleased to present the Annual Report for the year ended 31 March 2025.

Some of the main events during the year are listed below. Full details of these and many other activities undertaken can be found in the relevant sections of this report.

Membership



Club Membership at 31 March 2024 is 40 - 5 less than in 2024. There are 9 Honorary Members. Council were delighted to accept a membership application at the end of the Club year 2024 from Alan Duncan and he was inducted in May 2024. With regret, resignations were accepted from John McCleery (who is now in a nursing home) and Kris Messagee (who having joined in May 24 was transferred to England), San Wong and Andreas Huber became inactive.

The Club was greatly saddened to record several deaths this year and extended condolences to family members. Greatly missed is PP Ronnie McLean who died peacefully in December in the RVH followed by his wife Doreen within a very short time in February. Ronnie was a member for 17 years, having joined in 2008; he was President in 2014/15 and served for many years on Council.



Condolences on their personal bereavements were extended to Trevor Hinds (on the death of his niece aged 50 with a young family in February) and Mark Davidson (on the death of his father-in-law in March).



The Club was also saddened to hear of the deaths of former members PP Courtenay Thompson in June (a long-standing member of 40 years, he joined in 1977 and was President 2008-09) and John Toner in November as well as the passing of those well known to the Club: Inner Wheel Club of Belfast Hon. Secretary and Past President Beryl Crawford, a doyen of their Club in May; Derek Wilson (Corrymeela) in November (a remarkable man of vision and peace with exceptional work on reconciliation in Corrymeela; he introduced the Club to Seeds of Hope and the San Antonio Club and Dame Joan Harbinson in April (NI Equality Commissioner).

Several members and family members experienced ill-health, some have had treatments, medical operations or procedures and the Club wish them all well.

Most donations were directed to the Children in Hospital Appeal; flowers were sent to Doris Houston and Helen Johnston's Care Home Staff.

This year no recipients were identified and Convenor John Rea has been researching new areas for the distribution of these funds.



Youth Service Report

YouthAction NI (YANI)

The Club has continued to focus on continuing the support for YouthAction both practically, by members imparting their business knowledge and personal skills in order to help these young people build their futures and financially, by again providing support for

an Internship at the Youth Action Headquarters which in the year 2024/25 supported Rachael Hasson for her PR and Comms Internship and for 2025/2026 will be supporting a Marketing intern working across fundraising, marketing and PR as well as various Youth Work Programme activities. President Ken handed over the cheque at the Club meeting, 31 March to Senior Leader Clare Conlon, Fundraising



and Development Manager Grace O'Neill and Rachael who, having finished her internship, is now working as their Impact and Communications Admin.



On Monday 22 July over coffee at Youth Action's Beans and Dreams Cafe, President Ken, along with IPP Steven Costello, PPs David Boyd, Brian Clements and Alan Rundle and Rtns. Malcolm Griffiths and John O'Carroll had an interesting discussion with YouthAction's Senior YouthStart Youth Worker Sean Madden, Olivia who is responsible for the Beans and

Dreams Cafe and Senior Youth Worker for Peace-building Mark Clegg. Topics covered included the Club's relationship with Youth Action, plans for future Rotaract activity and ongoing links with Corrymeela and Seeds of Hope.

A gala performance of YANI's latest production "Everybody's talking about Jamie" was held on 09 August at which President Ken, Christopher and I attended. We had a most entertaining evening, enjoyed talking to Clare Conlon, Mark Clegg and Grace O'Neill during the reception about YANI's work and were greatly impressed at the talent of the young people! The show's message was one of inclusivity - a great topic, considering during the week there were conflicting protests of anti-immigrant and anti-racist protests. Belfast town centre was blocked off to cars, so there was a worry people might stay away, but there was still a full house! It was a most heart-warming night when everyone had fun!

5 Rotarians (unfortunately 2 could not attend due to illness) and a potential member had the privilege of assisting at YouthAction's Big Skills Day Wednesday 13 November. The

format again consisted of a Dragon's Den session for the 50 young people with tables of 10. Each table decided on a potential business and one member stood up and explained their plan which was challenged by the Dragons. The second half comprised helping to write CVs as well as other workshops.



Also that day, YouthAction held their AGM at which Pamela Ballentine was elected as their Chair. It was noted that their income was £2.8m but their expenditure had been £3.2m; they are working towards breaking even for 2024 and have been fundraising over the winter.

Generation Chef



Rtn. Trevor Stewart, Lisburn Rotary Club, is responsible for creating the culinary skills competition Generation Chef, in which, this first year, he has coordinated 7 Northern Ireland Rotary clubs to come together to support their local Training Colleges and visited the Club several times to provide updates. The competition is dedicated to organizing nationwide competitions for aspiring young chefs, providing them with valuable opportunities to showcase their skills and talent. Through Generation Chef, Rotary helps to coordinate catering college and industry sponsors to foster growth in the culinary field. Sponsors for placements and prizes have been

offered from business contacts around the country for the participants, demonstrating how important this competition is being seen within the industry.

Over 12 weeks, 54 aspiring student chefs have been enhancing their cooking and service expertise to deliver a premium culinary experience. 6 Regional heats are currently underway and a team from each region will compete in the inter-college final in May which will test their cooking and hospitality and hone their ability to work together as a team in a professional environment - a winning team of 3 chefs will be selected.

The Club, represented by PP Brian, John O'Carroll and myself are supporting the Belfast Metropolitan College, Titanic Quarter and we are honoured to play our part in the



inauguration of this enterprising competition. We have had the extra pleasure of sampling and critiquing the three course meals during the




trial runs which have already proved to be of an exceptionally high standard!

It will be presented to Chairman Seamus Camplisson in the coming months during a planned Club visit to Glebe House

The John A Savage Memorial Trophy and Bursary is awarded by the Club annually to the individual or group selected as giving great service to the Community.

Inaugurated in 2009 the Cup has been specially refurbished and created in memory of former member the late John Savage - a Club member who was man of action with great ability, high ethical and moral standards - his Scouting career was unique! - Scout Master; Group Scout Leader and latterly President of his own Group.





Rotary Foundation Report

District Grants

The Club has again been recognised as being in the Top Ten contributors in District 1160, with donations to The Rotary Foundation of more than \$100 per member and more than \$55 per member to Polio Plus.

The Club submitted 2 District Foundation Grant applications of \$5,000 each:

- * a District Grant of \$4,000 was progressed to RI for Harmony Community Trust for the refurbishment of their kitchen facility in the Harry Corscadden Building
- the request for Seeds of Hope was declined as the project has not yet been accepted for a Global Grant

An application from the RC San Antonio and RC Belfast for a Global Grant for the Seeds of Hope programme has been finally submitted to RI and a decision is awaited.

The Club wishes to maximise Foundation Grant applications and Service Chairs are urged to keep projects in mind to for which Grants could be applied for.

Seeds of Hope

The Club continues to support Seeds of Hope, the high-profile Peace and Reconciliation Programme operated by Corrymeela in Ballycastle.

In her address to the Club On 23 October Jean Horstmann highlighted that the first 1 year "learning journey" finished in July. 70 participants from 17 countries came together to explore the dynamics of hope and a conflict affected society through each other's stories and experience. The participants included 20 from San Antonio and the graduates from the 1st pilot programme, who she revealed had been great 'hosts' being very solicitous that all felt comfortable and organised an increasingly popular early morning swims in Ballycastle. This, she pointed out, was all about trust as some had never seen an ocean, some had never seen a cold ocean and some had never been in a cold ocean but all felt comfortable with the experience and enjoyed it! From the levy of a small fee the pilot programme raised £5,000 to fund any project of their choice in practicing leadership in their communities in NI. The 2nd phase of the pilot has commenced.

At the District Conference Gala Dinner an auction for Seeds of Hope raised €6,100. Around €4,000 for the holiday donated by the RC San Antonio of a 4-night/5-day stay in San Antonio and the surrounding "Texas Hill Country" and the rest in other prizes. 2 books signed by Lady Mary Peters and a bottle of her gin (Golden Girl gin from the Titanic Distillery) was won by a member of Dublin RC.



The Club were saddened to learn of the sad passing of Derek Wilson, a man of vision and peace who did remarkable work on reconciliation in Corrymeela and Jean Horstman

worked with him from the late 70's. He introduced the Club to Seeds of Hope and the San Antonio Club.

Sustaining Membership

As at 31st March, the Club still has 26 members contributing directly. Members are reminded that Council encourages all members to sign up. The annual cost of \$100 translates to circa £7 per month. However Club Membership is then reduced by £30 resulting in a monthly cost of approx. £4 pm - *joining details are available from me.*

What is The Rotary Foundation?

In his address to the Club 20 January PDG Howard in a very detailed, comprehensive and illuminating presentation gave a complete review of the workings of The Rotary Foundation.



The Funds - the Rotary Foundation comprises 3 separate Funds:

Annual Fund - provides the District and Global Grants both of which can be applied for by a Club or District. Disaster Relief Grants and Programme of Scale grants can only be applied for by a District.

* District Grants - help fund small-scale, short-term activities in the local community & in communities abroad that address humanitarian needs. Projects must adhere (loosely) to the 7 Areas of Focus. The amount available in any year is always based on an earlier year's donations - a District can request up to 23.75% of Annual Fund donations made 3 years previously.

As Rotarians and Clubs contributed \$126,391.93 in 2022-23 the amount available for District Grants in 2024-25 will be \$30,017

* Global Grants - support large international activities with a minimum budget of \$30,000 with sustainable, measurable outcomes in Rotary's areas of focus. A Project must adhere (very closely) to the 7 Areas of Focus, it must address a need identified by the recipient community & must be sustainable. Many worthy projects are way beyond the scope of even the biggest Clubs but when all Clubs contribute to a central fund, grants made from that fund can support projects that no single Club could envisage and at least 66% of Annual Fund donations in a year come back to the District for Club projects 3 years later.

In 2023-24 total expenditure of the Rotary Foundation was \$347.2m 80.4% of which was allocated to programmes



Rotary Foundation Report cont...

PolioPlus Fund - co-funds the Global Polio Eradication Initiative. The Foundation has been involved with Polio eradication since 1985 and to date Rotary on its own has allocated \$2.3billion and last year £146m. The current number of cases recorded since Covid is very disappointing but Rotary is not giving up as we are now in the end game.

Endowment Fund - provides a permanent and sustainable source of funding through investment. The aim is to create a fund of \$2.025 billion by 2025.

Donations Required

RI request donations to the

- * Annual Fund of \$100 per capita (approx. £82)
- * PolioPlus Fund of \$1,500 per Club (approx. £1,230) or \$55 per capita (approx. £45)
- * Endowment Fund: none

Howard acknowledged that the Club exceeds these figures.

- last year the Club contributed:\$137.86 per capita to the Annual Fund and was one
 of the 29 District clubs (out of 67) to meet the \$100 requirement
- Rotary Ireland District were the top District contributor in RGBI with a level of \$131.31 pc (even without 1 very large contribution) whereas the average was \$59.75.
- Last year the Club contributed \$2,192 in total to the Polio Plus Fund
- the District per capita figure was \$38 which again favourably compared with RIBI's \$32pc

Howard stressed the benefit of being a Sustaining Member - that as 25% Gift Aid can be claimed on Sustaining Fund payments, the Government contributes £18!

Rotary's 7 Areas of Focus

Howard highlighted that the 7 areas of Focus reflect Rotary's Mission Statement which was rewritten when Environment was added several years ago. He demonstrated this by showing both - colour coded appropriately.

The Rotary Foundation is ...

Rotary's own & Rotary's only charity whose mission is to help members to advance world understanding, goodwill, and peace by improving health, providing quality education, improving the environment, and alleviating poverty.

The 7 Areas of Focus

- 1. Promoting Peace
- 2. Fighting Disease
- 3. Providing Clean Water & Sanitation
- 4. Supporting Education
- 5. Saving Mothers & Children
- 6. Growing Local Economies
- 7. Protecting the Environment



International Report



As with previous years, we have continued to invest in the Lendwithcare scheme. All new loans were funded by scheduled repayments from existing loans, all of whom managed to make their payments as planned, despite facing difficult trading conditions and the negative effects of climate change.

When selecting projects to fund, as well as individuals, we have continued to put emphasis on cooperative groups, who have come together in an attempt to improve living standards for their wider family or local community.

This investment strategy means that, while individual entrepreneurs with large family and wider responsibilities are supported, cooperative groups who can have a major impact on the prosperity of their local communities are given priority. This results in the spread of our investments across as wide a range of entrepreneurs as possible.

The projects we supported this year ranged from co-operative farming, retail and manufacturing to individuals selling and working to expand their family micro businesses.





Namisu 1 Group Farming / Malawi

Chileleko Group Trade / Zambia

Evelin Johanna Farming / Equador

Since our initial involvement in December 2017, we have made a total of 123 loans (worth $\pm 6,005$). This has enabled us to:

- * help 526 entrepreneurs 1,691 family members
- * create 242 Jobs and
- * help a total of 2,459 people.

This is a remarkable achievement and excludes the contributions made by Club members who have joined the scheme on an individual basis and continue to invest/reinvest on an ongoing basis.



As with previous years, ShelterBox continues to be the priority project for the Club's international support. During the year our Hon. Treasurer passed on a total of £9,242 (inclusive of Gift Aid) to the District Treasurer on behalf of the Club for the ShelterBox appeal.



International Report cont...

This was made up as follows:

- Joint Clubs public fundraising event £1,867 held on 05-07 April 2024 in Bloomfield Shopping Centre, Bangor, in conjunction with the Rotary Clubs of Bangor, Donaghadee and Belfast East
- Tent for Lent appeal £1,252 this appeal was held during the Lenten period when members made donations to the appeal in an effort to boost support at Club level for ShelterBox
- Individual Donations 6,213 throughout the year a number of individual members purchased a ShelterBox in lieu of buying presents for family or friends at Christmas, or to mark a special occasion in their personal life.

John Cleverly, ShelterBox's Rotary Marketing Officer, congratulated and thanked the Club for "the amazing fundraising that the Club carried out with your community and as a Club. In recognition the Club has been recognised as a Silver Partner and awarded a Silver Certificate".





As with last year, in response to the continuing homeless plight throughout the world, due to natural disasters and widespread conflicts, we plan, in conjunction with the Rotary clubs of Bangor, Donaghadee, North Down and Inner Wheel, to repeat our public fundraising event in Bloomfield Shopping Centre in Bangor over the weekend period 10-12 April. We are hopeful that, with the combined

efforts of our partner clubs, we will be able to make a further large donation to ShelterBox in the coming months.

International Visitors

The Club continues to welcome international Rotarian visitors to the Club meetings and events and during this year we were delighted to be joined by Rotarians from other clubs and individual international guests. (see page 34)

End Polio Now

The Club continues to support the End Polio Now campaign both through individual members contributions and our annual payment to District via the member annual subscription.

Club International Committee

A small international committee has been formed within the Club and the enthusiastic members are keen to expand the Club's commitment to international service and to examine increased links with international cultural groups at home and abroad.

Communications Report

Glebe House (Harmony Community Trust)

The Club continues to be involved with and support Harmony Community Trust (HCT) which will celebrate its 50th Anniversary on 08 April.

The resilience of staff and volunteers has got Glebe House through many difficulties in recent years from the fallout from Covid which laid bare the social inequalities of society for children and young people, isolation of older people and onset of mental health issues to the continuing funding cutbacks of the current public expenditure environment which leaves the existence of Harmony Community Trust seriously under threat.

Following the cutbacks in April 2023 the facility did temporally close but with HCT and RCB Councils' support and exceptional volunteer involvement adult activities have continued apace, comprising *Chi Me; Knitwits, a Singing Circle,*



Men's Shed, and a thriving popular Community Garden - a poly tunnel put up 18 months ago is attracting volunteers from around the local community tending the market garden and selling the flowers and vegetables produced. In addition, volunteers actively fundraised with quizzes, flower sales, craft fairs and very popular yoga/wild

swimming days with a mobile hot sauna on the beach! A toddler group 'Tots & Teenies' has also been run by a former staff member. A manager and bookkeeper were engaged in November but tragically were made redundant at the end of March.

HCT Council are hugely grateful to the Club for:

- applying for and obtaining a District Grant of \$4,000 which enabled the refurbishment of and electrical safety in the small kitchen in the Harry Corscadden Building and
- the awarding of the John Savage Trophy for 2023-24 which Council are very proud to receive in this 50th Anniversary year



However, the challenge is still there and, although the planned sale of the Rectory will help over the next months, the big test is how to move funding away from grants for specific purposes to unrestricted monies to fund salaries, upkeep, heating and insurance etc. The underlying aim is to keep going with the huge amount of local goodwill.
